Dear Ministers,

On behalf of the Drug Strategy Network of Ontario (DSNO), we appreciate and remain grateful for the federal funding that established and evaluated prescribed safer supply projects in select Canadian communities. The DSNO is deeply concerned that prescribed safer supply initiatives preventing and/or mitigating both individual and community harms, including deaths, are at-risk of defunding, at a time when the evidence¹ supports additional investments to support expansion. In Ontario an estimated 11,380 people are suspected to have died from drug poisoning in just the last 3 years, 2021-2023².

Established in 2008, the DSNO is an extensive, multi-sectoral network of municipal and First Nations drug strategies grounded in a 4-pillar approach with efforts in prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and enforcement-justice systems. Members of the Network have expertise in evidence-informed initiatives preventing and/or reducing the harms

that can arise from consuming regulated and/or unregulated substances. Unique in North America, the DSNO stretches across the urban, rural, and remote regions of Ontario, enabling a comprehensive understanding of the diverse challenges faced by communities.

Prescribed safer supply programs have demonstrated efficacy in providing multiple, concurrent benefits across several domains of significant interest in local municipalities, among service providers, residents, and others. For example, the DSNO and others welcome the reductions in overdose emergencies, in homelessness, and in the harms that can arise from self-managing withdrawal via unregulated drug markets. Improvements in physical and mental health for people typically disconnected from health and social services are significant achievements to scale up. Prohibiting expansion, and/or defunding existing safer supply programs, seems certain to compromise both individual and community health and safety, and exacerbate the burden of the worst drug poisoning crisis in Ontario's history for residents, public, and not-for-profit service providers.

Prescribed safer supply programs have established their place as part of a continuum of care options in realizing a comprehensive approach to issues of substance use. Urgent, life-saving funding is possible, and essential.

The DSNO is available to lend our substantial experience and expertise on drug-related issues and strategies in support of the development and/or implementation of evidence-informed initiatives in law, policy, and funding. Together our collective efforts can mitigate the impacts of the drug poisoning tragedy for the benefit of all residents.
